Channels of Glory –
Letter from Dr. Simon Zachariah

We have heard a lot about the beginning and the end of people, projects, and organizations. A good start is always appreciated in everything. Some say: ‘Well begun is half done’. But some are of opinion that ‘We cannot judge anything till we see the end of it. In any case we are ignoring the period in between the beginning and the end. But in my opinion, more than any of these things, it is the persistence and determination with faith in God that really matters. He is the One who lifts us when we fall. He is the One who heals us when we are wounded, and He is the one who refreshes us when we are depressed. When we go to see the Fourth of July fireworks, I always compare human efforts as one of those fireworks. Some begin with a loud sound and blast, but may be an unattractive one in the end. These are the ones that get the ‘Ooos...’ Some others have a soft start but end in a colorful blast. These get ‘Ah..hhha’ cheering. But some

others have an average start, average lift and several small blasts and a final huge blast. These are the ones that get “O..ooos” and “Ah...hhha”.

When I look back on the past ten years of this organization, I realize how God has protected and provided for all the needs of the organization in a miraculous way. We need not worry about our daily sustenance, because He has told us to “go to the other side of the lake”, and He won’t allow us to drown in the lake. When we were in India God helped us to work among people from low socio-economic group. Now when we look back, that organization is also doing well. At present there are many highly educated people in that community and they are helping each other. Recently I got the report and several photos of a camp project conducted by them. One girl from that community got a Master’s degree in Social Work and she took the initiative to conduct the camp project. All these happened because of the continued prayers and abundant grace and mercy from God. So let us not worry about a good beginning or a victorious end. God who has guided us thus far is able to provide the resources, day by day.

A few years ago someone asked me, “What is the reason for poverty?” I pointed out that I did not know what kind of poverty he was talking about. Was it poverty of wisdom, health, or money? I also stressed the fact that poverty of wisdom, health and money are all determined at birth. When a child is born to a set of parents there is very little the child can do to outgrow those circumstances.

When I thought further about this, I realized that prejudice, stereotyping and social stigma can also be grouped in the “poverty syndrome”. No matter how much we are educated about certain diseases, it is very hard to overcome the stigma which is prevalent in society. I remember an occasion when a mission hospital was offered a brand new multistory building, if they agreed to start a wing for the treatment of patients with leprosy. Another time the same hospital was offered all the financial help to start a branch for the treatment of mentally ill patients. Both these offers were gracefully denied because the local people held all these diseases as a social stigma.

Some people have a strong opposition to organ donation and even blood donation because of the above mentioned stigma attached to these conditions. I have come to realize that when certain conditions which are considered as social stigma happens to occur in our families or to our loved ones, we have a strong tendency to see it differently and we tend to justify it with many reasons.

So in 2015, let us make a new decision to honor and appreciate who are rich in their attitudes and try to learn from their courage to stand up for what is right and just. Do you know what God wants from us? Only three simple things. (Micah 6:10)
